

Introduction to a State Report

A state report is a report for which you research information about your selected state and put this information into a written and pictorial format.

The pages which follow are guidelines for this type of report. You may use these pages in two ways.

- 1. They can be the actual pages of your report, completed by your research.
- They can serve as springboards for your own ideas on how best to organize and complete your report, with you creating each page in your own words and style.



Not all of the pages will be applicable to your state. Use what applies for your particular report. Similarly, not all of the areas you would like to cover may be represented by the pages given. Create new pages for these areas! Here are some ideas you might use.

- ☆ State animal
- ☆ State tree
- ☆ Motto
- ☆ Fashions
- ☆ Customs
- ☆ Ethnic make-up
- ☆ Comparison of past and present resources

- ☆ Historical notes behind flag or other symbols
- Additional maps, graphs, and charts about specific areas such as geography areas and their climate
- ☆ Religions
- ☆ Elaboration on native plants and animals
- ☆ State character




