**Clues:**

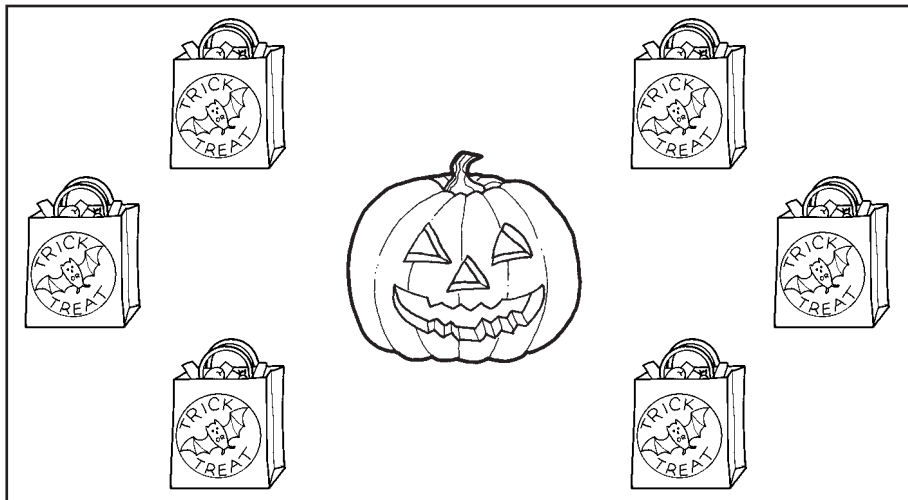
1. The hostess sat at the head of the table, but she didn’t masquerade as a ghost or as Cinderella.

5. Sean sat directly across from the vampire and to the immediate right of the mummy.
6. Philip sat directly across from Cinderella, but he did not sit beside Frankenstein.

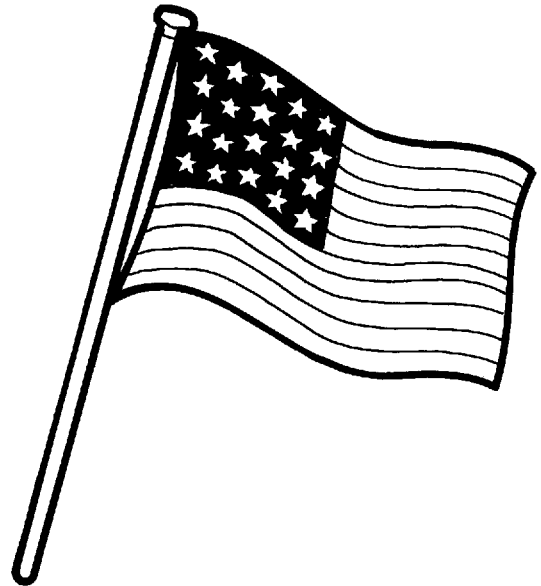

# Patriotic Holidays

Five of our nationally observed holidays are Memorial Day (last Monday in May), Independence Day (July 4), Labor Day (first Monday in September), Veterans Day (November 11), and Columbus Day (second Monday in October). These holidays are known by other names, some of which are days celebrated in other countries on the same dates as their American counterparts. Use the following clues to match the two names for each holiday.

**Clues:**

1. The day that marks the anniversary of America’s birthdate is neither Veterans Day nor Columbus Day.
2. The holiday that honors American veterans who fought or lost their lives in wars is not known as the Eight-Hour Day.
3. The Spanish holiday, translated “Day of the Roses,” honors the Hispanic heritage of the Latin-American people. The American counterpart of this holiday was named after an explorer for Spain.
4. The two holidays that are celebrated on the same dates every year are neither the Eight-Hour Day nor Decoration Day.
5. Armistice Day and the Eight-Hour Day are celebrated in the fall season of the year.
