### **Equipment**

- story starters
- writing materials

#### **Trait Development**

(Your teacher may have you work with a small group to complete this exercise.)

Read the story starter your teacher gives you. Consider the questions "What if . . . ?" and "What happens next?" Write two follow-up sentences to come after the story starter. Fold the paper over so your writing does not show. Pass the paper to the next person in your group. As each person passes his or her paper around, you will receive another story. Write two more sentences for that story, without reading what the previous person wrote. Continue writing sentences and passing the stories around until you have received your original story starter back. Unfold the papers and read the silly stories to each other.

#### **Check Yourself**

Discuss with others in your group how these mixed-up stories do or do not exhibit characteristics of the fluency trait. What factors affected the fluency? How were these stories easier or harder to understand?
