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Second in Charge

(Based on Genesis 41)

It was Joseph's God-given ability to interpret dreams that finally got him out of prison. Two years after his cupbearer was released from prison and given his job back, Pharaoh had a strange dream. He was standing by the Nile River when he saw seven fat, healthy cows come up out of the water. They grazed among the river reeds for a while. Then seven skinny, unhealthy cows came up out of the water. Suddenly, the skinny cows ate up the fat cows. The dream was so frightening, it woke Pharaoh up. When he was able to get back to sleep, he had another dream. This time he saw seven fat heads of grain that were eaten up by seven thin, worthless heads of grain. Again, the dream woke him up, and he tried to figure out what it meant.

The next morning, Pharaoh was so troubled by his dreams, he sent for all the wise men and magicians in Egypt to see if anyone could explain what they meant. No one had any idea. Suddenly, Pharaoh's cupbearer remembered Joseph. He explained that when he and the baker had been in prison a Jewish slave named Joseph had explained their dreams, and what he said came true.

Pharaoh eagerly called for Joseph to be brought to him. "I have heard it said of you that when you hear a dream you can interpret it," Pharaoh said to him.

Though he was a foreign slave talking to the highest ruler in the land, Joseph was not shy. "I cannot do it," he said, "but God will give Pharaoh the answer he desires." So Pharaoh described what he had dreamed and Joseph explained the meaning. The cows and the heads of grain represented years. 
